

This award is presented annually to an undergraduate psychology major attending a New Jersey college or university, who has demonstrated exceptional research potential. Carol and Bahar will be presenting their research at the New Jersey Psychological Association conference on October 20th.

**Carol Chu** earned a B.A. in Psychology in May, 2007. Her Honors thesis project was entitled "The Impact of Graduate Students' Perceptions of Social Support Systems and Acculturation of their Mental Health and Perceptions of Stress." Her project was supervised by **Dr. Kathleen Torsney**.

**Bahar Mansur** earned a B.A. in Psychology in May, 2007. Her Honors thesis project was entitled "The Effects of Thought Suppression on the Accessibility of Food-Related Thoughts." Her project was supervised by **Dr. Elizabeth Haines**. **Dr. Neil Kressel** oversees the Social Science Honors Track.

**Dr. Philip Cioffari**, Professor of English and Director of the Performing and Literary Arts Track, has a collection of stories entitled *Catholic Boys* forthcoming with Livingston Press.

**Dr. Susan Dinan**, Associate Professor of History and Director of the University Honors College, has written an article entitled "A Community Outside a Cloister" in *Defining Community in Early Modern Europe*, edited by Michael Halvorson and Karen Spierling. Aldershot: Ashgate [forthcoming]

**Dr. Jeffrey Kresky**, Professor of Music and Director of the Honors Music Track, has written an article entitled "Some Unusual Tonic Six-Fours" to appear in the journal *In Theory Only* (volume 32, 2007). He has also been conducting performances of Gilbert and Sullivan operettas with the New York Gilbert and Sullivan Players and the Light Opera Company of Salisbury.

## ***Eleven Honors GE classes to be offered this spring***

### ***ANTH 130-03 -- Introduction to Anthropology***

**C. Natrajan -- MW, 12:30-1:45**

Students learn key anthropological concepts *culture, ideology and power* to interrogate *diversity* and *inequality* within human populations, globally and within the USA. Major questions raised are: What is culture? What is cultural diversity? What are its challenges and uses? How are social inequalities produced and reproduced through cultural and ideological means? How can an understanding of culture and diversity aid us in addressing contemporary issues of local and global concern? This course introduces students to a holistic, comparative and historical framework for analysis. This is an intensive writing and analytical course.

### ***ARTH 101- Approaches to Western Art***

**C. Goldstein -- MW, 2:00 – 3:15**

A study of the major movements, individuals and issues in visual art, from its origins in the cave paintings of Altamira and Lascaux through its continuation into the present. The course emphasizes the acquisition of visual literacy in "reading," analyzing and understanding art. Opportunities to view and interact with original art are emphasized, along with the development of student writing skills.

### ***COMM 101 - Introduction to Theatre***

**J. Beal -- F, 11:00 - 1:40**

A wide-ranging and free-wheeling look at theatre in all its aspects from all sides- script, staging, performing, watching, directing, technical work, historical, contemporary, dramatic, comedic, and musical. In short, we try to answer these questions: what is theatre, and why should we care?

### ***ENG 150 - Introduction to Literature***

**S. Fisher -- MW, 3:30 – 4:45**

This course gives students a sense of a literary tradition unfolding across time in the genres of poetry, drama, essay and fiction.

### ***ENV 110 - Environmental Foundations***

**K. Swanson -- WF, 9:30 – 10:45**

**Lab: F, 12:30 – 3:15**

This course will stress a holistic view of the environment from the viewpoints of several disciplines of the sciences, the social sciences and the humanities.

### ***HIST 102 - The West and the World: The Age of Discovery to Decolonization***

**S. Dinan -- MW, 8:00 – 9:15**

This class begins with the question, what is the modern world? To answer it we will examine political, social, cultural, intellectual and economic developments from the sixteenth century to the present. By reading and analyzing a variety of primary sources, we will grapple with the issues considered paramount by people at different moments in European history.

### ***PEGE 200 -- Active Lifestyles for Health***

**G. Schmidt, R. Blonna -- WF, 11:00 – 12:15**

Physical Education for aerobic conditioning and life-long good health!

### ***PSY 110 -- General Psychology (ONLINE)***

**J. Austin**

This course provides a broad overview of the field of psychology and the study of the human mind and behavior. This online format promotes involvement through an active discussion board and interactive learning modules. A variety of assignments encourage students to translate theories and concepts into a meaningful context related to their own lives and experiences.

### ***SOC 101 -- Principles of Sociology***

**Mark Ellis -- TR, 3:30-4:45**

The course is intended to familiarize students with the major subject areas, methods and concepts of the sociological perspective. Students will be challenged to develop their "sociological imaginations" -- to self-consciously imagine themselves as "permanent strangers" in our familiar social world. Students should walk away from this course with a set of analytical tools to better understand complex social problems. Moreover, students should continue to see themselves as problem solvers as they continue to develop a sense of community responsibility while always eradicating social injustice and practicing social equality/justice.

### ***SPAN 106 – Basic Intensive Spanish I and II***

**O. DelaSuaress -- MTWR, 2:00 – 3:15**

This course offers students the opportunity of completing the university language requirement (6 credits) in one semester by covering the entire first year curriculum in an intensive setting. Cultural activities supplement this unique experience for the exceptionally motivated student.

### ***WS 150 – Racism and Sexism***

**S. Bedell -- TR, 2:00 – 3:15**

In common with standard sections, this course will examine racism, sexism, heterosexism, and classism looking at current laws, historical documents, academic articles, films, and hearing the personal experiences of other students. Engaging the topics, students will read critically, write on complex topics and work at concept development. Such skill development assignments will prepare students for an intensive undergraduate program regardless of major.

Honors Sections of General Education courses are specifically designed for high achieving students and are created by faculty members who wish to teach these students in a unique way.

General Education courses introduce students to the basic concepts, issues and methods in major fields of study and knowledge.

The Honors versions of these courses offer a smaller class size (20 or fewer students), more individualized instruction and attention, and more interesting and challenging coursework than regular General Education courses.
