# SYLLABUS—LBST 2500: Ethics and Community Engagement Winter 2022 online asynchronous

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# **General Information**

In every society, individuals must struggle with balancing their own rights and freedoms with their responsibilities towards others. Liberal Studies and Community Engagement explores the **ethical reasoning** needed to bring individuals together into a community that allows connection and reciprocity while respecting individuals' autonomy. This course covers topics in ethical theory involving individual rights, social justice and applied ethics, including strategies for engaging with ethical issues in the community and requires a civic engagement project in which ethical theory is applied.

#### **Course Objectives**

In this course you will:

- --Examine important historical and current views of ethics and responsible citizenship and illuminate the values and methods of problem-solving.
- --Identify assumptions, goals, and principles in current and past debates about ethics and responsible citizenship.
- --Distinguish arguments based on rights or ethical principles from arguments based on economic efficiency, social utility, and religious belief;
- --Assess the effects of individual, government, community, and/or corporate decisions on human life, society, and the environment.
