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Description of Course: This course will examine gendered icons, sexualized images, and queer bodies in a variety of contexts, focusing on popular culture and media representations. The course will explore the relationship between media icons, images, representations, and ideas about gender/women/sexuality/ queerness/ability in a racialized and classed society and the different perspectives to challenge dominant social norms. Readings will focus on authorship, spectatorship, production, and media content taken from feminist film theory, queer theory, cultural studies, digital media studies, and game studies. As popular culture has also been a site of political and social struggles for cultural expression and assertion of identities, this course will engage with the rapidly changing media landscape and ways to be critical consumers of popular culture.

<u>Required Texts</u>: None. All readings available on WWW/Blackboard (BB)/library database.

Course Objectives: The course will

- a) Understand key theories and methods of studying media icons, images and representations in their cultural, historical, and political contexts.
- b) Analyze the intersections of gender and sexuality in the media with categories such as race, class, ability and nation to create dominant ideologies

- c) Critically evaluate the connections between media content creators (media concentration) and their emerging power over consumers.
- d) Investigate the technologies of representation and commodification that characterize the production of media(ted) icons/images and representations of diverse groups.
- e) Enable crafting and communication of ideas orally and visually through creative projects

Student Learning Outcomes: Students will be able to

- a) Develop literacy skills to examine media icons, images, and representations, their diversity and power in cultural, historical, and political contexts
- b) Engage with cross disciplinary studies to critically analyze the intersections of gender and sexuality in the media with race, class, ability, and nation
- c) Evaluate the role of a critical consumer of media in an information age against powerful media content creators.
- d) Demonstrate an understanding of technologies of representation and commodification to unravel power and identity formation
- e) Display information and analytical competence by communicating with clarity and fluency

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Class format: The course is delivered via Blackboard, which is your online learning community, where you are expected to interact with your classmates and instructor. You will be able to access the learning materials, syllabus, discussion boards, submit assignments, and participate in online discussions and activities. An online course will require as much time in preparation and participation as a regular classroom course. As in any other course, you must 'attend' class regularly by logging onto Blackboard; you will not be able to make up weeks in which you have been absent. It is your responsibility to check your WPUNJ email account and blackboard (BB). - Participation and assignments: You are expected to read the assigned readings and participate in the online discussions. Based on your reading, you will need to post your response on the "discussion board" (DB) or in "assignments" on BB by the due date.
- Communication: All communication will be sent on email and messages will only be sent to your wpunj.edu account. Grades will be upgraded on blackboard periodically. It is your responsibility to check your WPUNJ email account and blackboard (BB).
 - Gender-Inclusive/Non-Sexist Language for in class participation and "Netiquette": To enable an inclusive environment and enrich discussion and reflection the class will make every effort to use gender-inclusive and non-sexist language i.e words that affirm and respect how people describe, express, and experience their gender like individuals whose identities (including trans, intersex, and genderqueer) may not fit the gender binary, and/or who may not identify with the sex they were assigned at birth.
 Misgendering is disrespectful and dismissive. Students may share their preferred pronouns (he/she/ze/they) and names, and these gender identities and gender expressions will be honoured.



✓ Class policy:

- Assignments: Based on your reading, you will need to respond on the "discussion board" (DB) or in "assignments" on BB by the due date. Each assg will be accompanied with instructions on expectations and grading rubric. Online discussion boards and assignments will be closed for a particular response thread at midnight on the day it is due. Your first post will be graded as your assignment. Hence do not post multiple times different parts of the assignment. Also emailing me your response after it is due will be considered a late assignment. You are free to raise questions, pose queries, post additional responses, etc. When you respond to your classmates highlight the post you are referring to and follow rules of classroom etiquette /online netiquette and propriety.
- Submissions: All submissions (discussion posts/assignments) will be in 12-point font and within the word limit described in the assignment. Organize them for coherency, flow, and fullness. Edit

your responses for flow and grammar before submission. Your response will engage with the readings which are from the text, journal articles, films, or other scholarly sources (use library e-journals) and all evidence, counter evidence, arguments, ideas should be cited appropriately (<u>must draw from scholarly sources</u>). For citations use in-text parenthetic notes, footnotes, or endnotes. A bibliography/list of references should be placed at the end of your paper. You can follow any citation system and format (from your major discipline). For those of you who do not have one, here is a suggested **citation style**. Check the APA style of citation at http://www.lib.berkeley.edu/instruct/guides/apastyle.pdf Do not cite more than 2 sentences at any time directly from the text. Try to summarize or paraphrase the idea from the text. If needed, use the Writing Center resources.

 - What is the main idea of the reading(s)?
 - How do(es) the reading(s) relate to the larger issue/class topic? What is the relevance of this article/essay/chapter?
 - How do the readings relate to each other?
 - How do the readings relate to previous reading and topics we have covered?
 - SUGGESTION: take notes when you read and follow the logic and nature of evidence. It may be useful to summarize an article within 1/10th of its length. Or try to summarize each paragraph with one sentence/point. Try this!
